
president's CORNER

neighborhood survey results

RNNA is grateful to the Ridglea North neighbors who participated in our recent 2017 Neighbor Survey. The responses have already proven to be helpful as the RNNA Executive Board continues to work toward the initiatives that matter most to you. Here are some of the results from the survey for your review:

- Survey responders were evenly divided between three age groups (20s and 30s, 40s and 50s and 60+), and 42% of surveyed neighbors have school-aged children living at home.
- Neighborhood entryways were the top beautification priority (48%), followed by continued Berney Park improvements (32%) and medians throughout the neighborhood (20%). See page 5 for more information about these ongoing initiatives.
- Over half (52%) of neighbors wish to see RNNA partner with the City on additional street lighting. We have shared specific requests with City leaders, including the City Manager, Director of Transportation & Public Works and Councilman Brian Byrd, along with a request that our current lighting be evaluated for repair and compliance with placement policies.
- Upgraded playground equipment was another popular request (43%), followed by traffic management (39%) and electrical access in Berney Park (39%). RNNA Board Members are working with the City to determine Berney Park's eligibility for upgrades and have shared traffic-management requests and suggestions with members of the Transportation & Public Works Department.

I am honored to have earned your vote to serve as your voice on City Council. I have enjoyed meeting many of you at community and neighborhood events, and I look forward to working alongside you as we strive to improve the great City of Fort Worth.

One of the reasons I decided to run for City Council was my commitment to the revitalization of economically depressed areas of our city such as Las Vegas Trail, an area located just west of Ridglea North. During these first few months of my term, I have spent time learning about the history, needs and challenges of this neighborhood. The Fort Worth Police Department has been a community leader in these efforts, allowing me and other City leaders to join on a ride-along tour of the community.


Thankfully, the Star-Telegram has provided a much-needed spotlight on Las Vegas Trail and recently hosted a panel discussion on the future of the neighborhood. I had the privilege of sitting on this panel alongside some of the fiercest advocates of the Trail, including two school principals, a non-profit leader, and a Fort Worth police officer. The response was incredibly

encouraging. With more than 400 attendees from the community, the panel received thoughtful and insightful feedback. You can read more about the forum discussion [here](#).

The forum was only the beginning of a community-wide effort to revitalize the Trail. Although the panelists came from diverse backgrounds and experiences, a common theme emerged: the need for coordination of services. My office has recently announced the Las Vegas Trail Revitalization Project. Our first meeting is scheduled for October 24, where all members of the community are invited to join us as we begin to coordinate efforts for revitalization. The success of Las Vegas Trail will require a community-wide effort. Non-profits, faith-based groups, businesses and individuals must all play an integral role as we work toward a long-term solution for the area.

neighbor survey

- Nearly 95% of neighbors indicated a willingness to participate in a "Light Up the Night" campaign to keep exterior lights on every night in an effort to light up the neighborhood and deter crime.
- Because of widespread interest in crime reports from our NPO, those will now be distributed to all of the members of our communication database, not just to neighbors who sign up for them. And with 28% of Ridglea North neighbors interested in joining a crime watch program, our NPO hopes to help us kick start this initiative in early 2018.
- Because nearly 58% of our neighbors were interested in purchasing a "No Soliciting, No Handbills" sign for display on their property, RNNA hopes to offer these for sale (\$10 each) at the National Night Out event on October 3.
- Neighbors believe that several types of development add value to the Ridglea area, with the top three including restaurants/cafes (83%), specialty retail (70%) and grocery stores (43%). Most neighbors (about 95%) appreciate notifications about public hearings, meetings, zoning variance requests and proposed new developments. RNNA will continue to email notifications and post them to www.ridgleanorth.com.
- Concerning educational opportunities, neighbors are most interested in crime prevention (81%), homelessness solutions (64%), property value and tax appraisals (62%), local economics (60%) and commercial development in the Ridglea area (57%). RNNA will continue to extend opportunities for this type of content to our neighbors.

2017 national night out



park & green space updates

This fall and winter, RNNA hopes to “adopt” some of the medians in the neighborhood and begin some limited landscaping projects. A generous group of neighbors has made donations and offered volunteer hours to beautify and add Ridglea North signage to the large triangular median at the intersection of Westridge, Curzon and Greenway. Many thanks to these neighbors, as this will be a wonderful addition to the neighborhood and cue pass-through drivers to slow down as they enter our residential area.

The committee is also working with the family of a longtime Drury Lane neighbor to install a memorial bench and tree in her honor on the west end of the park. RNNA hopes to complete that project this fall and winter, as well.

supplemental maintenance

During rainy summers – like the last two – the grass in Berney Park gets high as the City's mowing schedule experiences delays. The RNNA Board knows how frustrating it is to see our beloved park looking overgrown, and has been actively seeking solutions to combine City-provided maintenance with RNNA's supplemental maintenance funds.

In April, the Board hired neighbor-owned Rock Haven Landscape to supplement the City's maintenance with mowing, edging, debris/trash/leaf removal and irrigation inspection four times a year. The Board has since voted to increase the budget to include up to six visits. Rock Haven came last week, and Berney Park looks amazing!

RNNA met with City Forester Melinda Adams last week to discuss some project ideas and the health of Berney Park's beloved crepe myrtles. While the crepe myrtles did show some evidence of scale residue, they were determined to be healthy and do not require treatment. The white, powdery substance on the trunks is from mealybugs, but a closer inspection revealed clusters of two-spotted ladybug pupae and an active colony of adult ladybugs – who happen to enjoy feasting on mealybugs! If you see these colonies at Berney Park, please leave them alone and allow them to clean up our crepe myrtles!



serve our schools this year

ML Phillips Elementary received five of six academic distinctions this year, including Post-Secondary Readiness, Academic Achievement in Reading and Science and Top 25 Percent in Student Progress and Closing the Achievement Gap. Way to go, MLP!

MLP was also selected this August as a recipient of the Safe Routes to School project in partnership with FWISD and Blue Zones Project. As a result, traffic flow will be addressed this fall and funding will be used over the next three years for infrastructure improvements that will ensure student safety.

Last week, I received several phone calls about a suspicious door-to-door solicitor who was reportedly attempting to sell magazines. I was informed that he was aggressively and persistently banging on doors. This behavior itself is not criminal unless you have a no-solicitation sign or tell a solicitor to leave your property. What concerned me, however, was the video footage I received from Ridglea North residents showing the solicitor trying door handles. The videos and photos were compiled into a file and sent out as a bulletin to all West Patrol Units. I also requested that some of the patrol sergeants discuss the bulletin in roll call. One resident was able to obtain a company name and the subject's "street name," which was very helpful.

Whether you have a "No Soliciting" sign or not, if a solicitor bangs on the door or rings the doorbell persistently, please call 911 with your concerns. Explain that a suspicious person is on your property and provide the most accurate description you can to dispatch. Inform the call taker that you would like to be called back regarding the outcome of the call. If the subject is trying your door handles, that demands an immediate 911 call. There will be plenty of time to call your spouse, friends or post the event on social media later – 911 needs to be the first call you make.

During the second week of September, I will be meeting with the property owners of the storefronts on Lackland. They are coming in from Connecticut and seem very motivated to assist FWPD in eliminating crime from that area. I will follow up soon with details.

zoning & development

RNNA has made an effort to increase engagement with neighbors, business owners and local government officials in order to stay up to date on what is happening in and around Ridglea North. As updates are available, they will be posted to www.ridgleanorth.com.

RNNA continues to monitor the Lidl and RaceTrac projects at Clayton and Camp Bowie. Lidl is working to secure final building permits from the City. Race Trac recently applied for, and received, a variance to sell alcohol at its location. The request was due to its proximity to the Fort Worth Montessori School, which did not oppose the variance.

Councilman Byrd has been meeting with Camp Bowie District (CBD) and business and property owners along Camp Bowie to discuss the proposed 2018 Public Improvement District (PID 8) budget. The proposed budget will go before City Council on September 12, but there are differences of opinion on how PID funds will be used. Councilman Byrd has scheduled a September 6 meeting with CBD, business owners and property owners to hash through the details in order to allow CBD to formally propose a PID budget to City Council. Zoning has been active this summer, primarily with the property at 6000 Malvey

Avenue, which was operating as an office and residence for the rental building's property management company. The case went to City Council in August and was rejected. The property management group was instructed to remove large "office" signs from the property and to cease operating the property as both an office and residence. RNNA is working with Councilman Byrd's office and the property management group to ensure appropriate use of the property going forward.

A few residents have raised concerns about the use of residential property for short-term rentals through apps like Airbnb and HomeAway. The State Legislature recently considered – but didn't pass – a bill which would have prevented Texas cities from restricting or banning the use of residential property for short-term rentals. This means that short-term rentals of 30 days or less continue to be prohibited in our neighborhood. Lastly, Freeze Factory (3400 Bernie Anderson) opened in July, while R Taco (3206 Winthrop), The Catch (6314 Camp Bowie) and Black Rooster Bakery (6333 Camp Bowie) are scheduled to open in September and October. On the retail front, Tuesday Morning (3501 Bernie Anderson) has officially opened in its new, more prominent location.

water and sewer rates

Based on proposed rates, Fort Worth residential customers will see their combined water and sewer bill increase by an average of \$3.31 per month in 2018. A report outlining the proposed rate changes is available in all Fort Worth libraries and on the City's website. The rate increases will be considered by City Council on September 12, and if approved, will take effect January 1. 
In the meantime, there are three more opportunities for you to share comments with City leaders and fellow residents. Proposed project lists will be presented at these three public forums and City reps from several departments will be

2018 BOND PROGRAM




street improvement plans

The Transportation & Public Works Department has reviewed our curbs and pavement surfaces and has scheduled several projects:

- The 2018 Street Rehabilitation Program will include asphalt surface overlay repair and the replacement of damaged curbs and gutters along Marys Lane (Garland to Greenway), Olive Place (Curzon to Hemsell) and Tex Boulevard (Calmont to Greenway).
- The 2019 Street Maintenance Program will include curb/gutter replacement and asphalt surface overlay repair along Ridglea Avenue (Curzon to Camp Bowie) and asphalt surface overlay repair along Curzon Avenue (Westridge to Ridglea).


